## Keynote Speaker

Judge Glenda Hatchett is renowned in the legal community for her groundbreaking courtroom style. Best known for her revolutionary "interventions," she is widely respected for her work with today's youth, which not only sets her apart from other judges but also establishes her as a leader in the justice system nationwide.

Judge Hatchett is also the author of the national bestseller *Say What You Mean and Mean What You Say* (Harper Collins, 2003) based on her extensive professional experiences as a jurist and her own personal experience as a mother of two boys.

The Judge also serves as a national spokesperson for Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA), a non-profit volunteer organization that trains volunteers to represent abused and neglected children and help them navigate the court system.
